One of the benefits of recycling is cutting energy consumption. Here are a few ways you can help.

ENERGY SAVING TIPS FOR YOUR CAR

Drive sensibly. Aggressive driving (speeding, rapid acceleration and braking) wastes gasoline, it can lower your highway gas mileage 33% and city mileage 5%.

Consider buying a highly fuel-efficient vehicle. A fuel-efficient vehicle, a hybrid vehicle, or an alternative fuel vehicle could save you a lot at the gas pump and help the environment.

Combine errands into one trip. Several short trips, each one taken from a cold start, can use **twice** as much fuel as one trip covering the same distance when the engine is warm.

Get regular engine tune-ups. Replacing clogged air filters can improve gas mileage by as much as 10% and protect your engine.

Keep tires properly inflated and aligned to improve your gasoline mileage by around 3%.

Use the grade of motor oil recommended by your car's manufacturer. Using different motor oil can lower your gasoline mileage by 2%.

Reduce drag by placing items inside the car or trunk rather than on roof racks. A loaded roof rack can decrease your fuel economy by 5%.

Clear out your car; extra weight decreases gas mileage.

WIDENER LAW REVIEW'S 2009 SUPERIOR AUTHORSHIP COMPETITION

Membership on a university's general law review is highly prized by legal employers, and is considered the preeminent achievement a law student can attain.

The Widener Law Review, the only official general law review of Widener University School of Law-Wilmington, will be hosting its annual Superior Authorship Competition this Spring. The Law Review routinely publishes on a broad scope of topics, ranging from constitutional law, corporate law, criminal law, and health law, among many others.

The Superior Authorship Competition is open to all students completing their second semester of 2RD or 3ED in the Spring of 2009. Eligible candidates that wish to be considered for membership on the *Widener Law Review* must select a topic and have it approved by Evan Miller, Internal Managing Editor, by *Wednesday*, *April 15*. The topic must be original (seminar and/or symposium topics will be accepted but still need to be submitted for approval) and each candidate must do his or her own research. The paper will be due at the end of June and must be at least thirty (30) full pages. Submitting a topic for approval DOES NOT obligate you to complete and hand in a paper. Those students that meet the *April 15 deadline* will receive further instructions upon approval of their topic.

Note that those who fall into either of the following categories are INELIGIBLE to participate in the Superior Authorship Competition:

- 1. Candidates who are not completing their second semester of 2RD or 3ED in the Spring of 2009, OR
- 2. Candidates whose cumulative GPA is below a 2.7 after the Spring semester of 2009.

Women's History Month: Clara Shortridge Foltz, Esq.

Clara Shortridge was born in Indiana in 1849. She attended school in Iowa until she was 15, when she eloped with Jeremiah Foltz. She was a farm wife in Iowa, then moved with her four children, her husband, and other family members to Portland, OR, and then to San Jose, CA. She had a fifth child before her divorce but was already active in petitioning the California legislature to enact the Woman Lawyer's Bill in 1876, enabling women to practice law. She then attempted to enter Hastings Law School, winning that battle via a court decision in 1879. Meanwhile Clara studied law in a law office and became the first woman to pass the CA state bar exam in December 1879. She studied law at Hastings for two years while maintaining a law practice. Her most enduring achievement introducing the concept of a public defender for indigent criminals in 1893. She lectured, published, and held several appointed positions in California before her death in 1934.
