REGARDING EXAMS

FINAL EXAMINATIONS

As final examinations approach, all students should take a few minutes to review the Law School rules relating to examinations. These rules may be found in §607-609 of the Academic Code and §203-205 of the Dean's Office Regulations.

According to §607 (f)(1) of the Code, all examinations are graded anonymously. Students should not discuss the examination process, including the possibility of exam deferral or exam accommodation with faculty members. Any attempt by a student to identify himself/herself to a professor by placing notes or messages on an examination or exam booklet compromises the anonymous grading system. All questions should be directed to Associate Dean of Student Affairs office or the Registrar's Office. Any compromise of the anonymous grading system by a student constitutes a violation of the Code of Conduct and could result in suspension or expulsion.

Permission to defer an examination will be granted only in extreme cases. Students should refer to the guidelines. Emergency deferrals will be granted to those students who, for medical reasons, are unable to sit for an examination when scheduled. A student who becomes ill and cannot take an examination when scheduled must call the Registrar's Office before the examination begins. If that student cannot appear in person or call the Registrar, he/she may miss the exam and apply for a deferral. An application for this type of deferral must be made within 48 hours of the original exam date and in no event later than the last day of regularly scheduled exams. The student must also provide the Registrar's Office with a letter from the attending physician which confirms that the student was unable to sit for the examination due to illness. Students who begin an examination and leave due to illness may not make up the examination on the makeup day. The examination must be retaken at the end of the next semester in which the course is offered.

Anonymous numbers

Anonymous numbers must be placed on all examination booklets and on the examination itself. In the unlikely event you forget to put your anonymous number on your papers before time is called, you may do so at the proctor's table when you turn in your exam. If you continue to write after the proctor has told you to stop, your examination number and the fact that you did not stop when told will be reported to the Registrar's Office and may ultimately be reported to the Office of Student Affairs.

Open book exams

You may bring into an open book exam only those items designated by the professor. If you are in doubt as to what can be brought into the exam, check with your professor before the examination.

Scrap paper

Scrap paper will only be permitted in an examination if the professor has specifically told the Registrar that it will be permitted. The proctor will distribute one scrap paper book to you during the examination.

Lavatory breaks

You are reminded that the honor code applies during the entire exam and a lavatory break does not mean there is a break in the honor code rules.

Student ID

Finally, remember to bring your student ID to each of your examinations. Students must be positively identified by the Registrar or proctor before sitting for each exam.

Students are reminded that the **Student Code of Conduct §202(1)** requires you to report all Code of Conduct violations.

Advice for New Lawyers from a Judge

In an article in the *National Law Journal*, Douglas S. Lavine, a judge on the Appellate Court of Connecticut, gives advice to young lawyers appearing in court. Most of his advice is basic and self-evident, but Judge Lavine has observed that not knowing how to act in court can put a new attorney at a real disadvantage. This is the thirteenth in a series that will share Judge Lavine's 20 points of good courtroom behavior.

13. Never knowingly misstate a fact.



In an individual case, and over a career, your credibility is your most valuable asset. Never do anything to undermine it. If you learn that you have misstated a fact, inform the court and opposing counsel Immediately. It is

better to admit 1,000 mistakes than to have the court, or opposing counsel, come to believe that you were aware of a misstatement and failed to correct it.

December 7 is Delaware Day



After the Constitutional Convention adopted a new federal Constitution in Philadelphia on September 17, 1787, Delaware's General Assembly quickly called for elections of

deputies from each county to meet in Dover to discuss ratification. Ten deputies were elected from New Castle, Kent, and Sussex Counties on November 26, and these 30 men met at Battell's Tavern, also known as the Golden Fleece, on December 3. The delegates discussed the articles of the Constitution and decided that this was a form of government advantageous to small states. They ratified the document on December 7, 1787, and thus became the first of the new American states to do so. This date appears on the Delaware state flag, and The First State appears on Delaware vehicle license plates. Since 1933, when the efforts of citizens to acknowledge this important date in history resulted in a resolution proclaiming December 7 as Delaware Day, there have been annual celebrations of the date.
