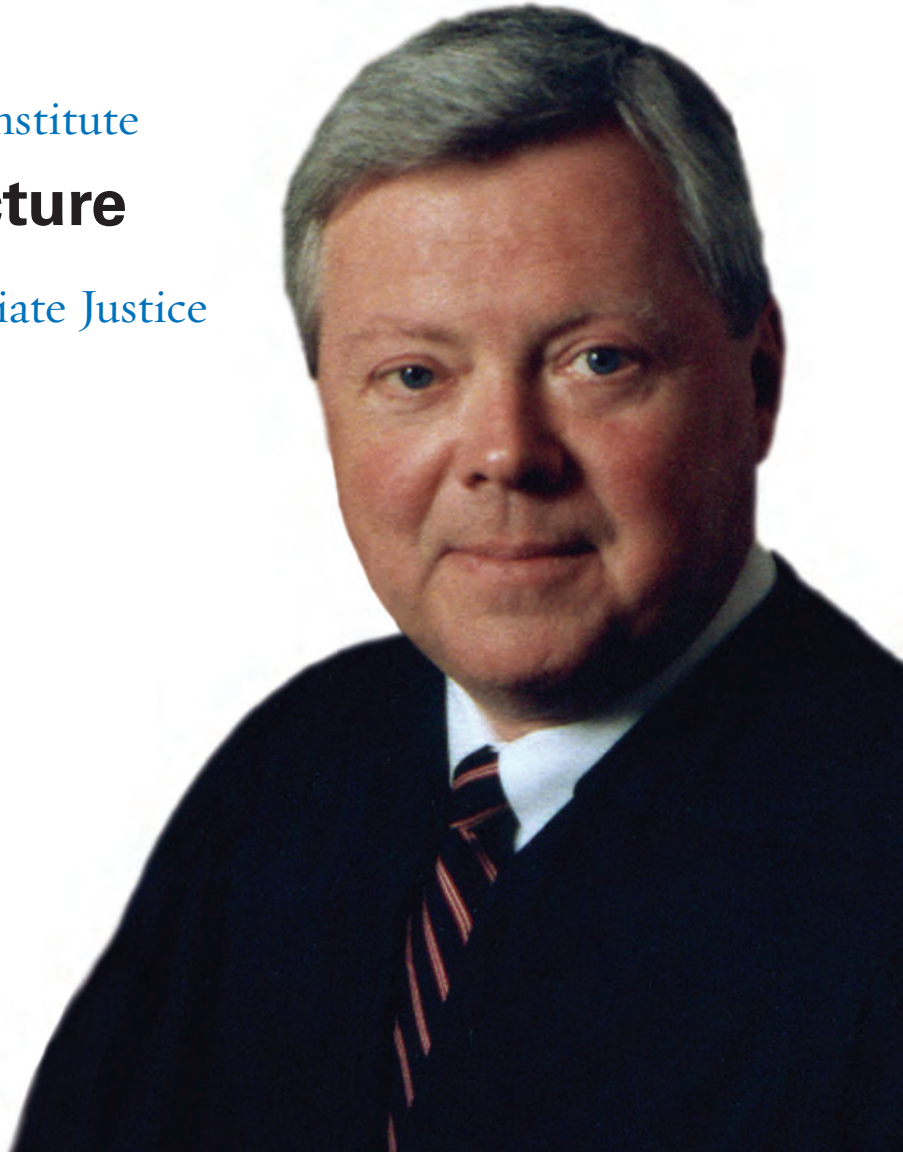

Pennsylvania Supreme Court Justice Thomas Saylor is the Widener University Law & Government Institute Jurist in Residence at the Harrisburg Campus. He will deliver the Fall Jurist in Residence Lecture, The Nature of Judging, on Monday, November 9, 2009 at 4:30 p.m. in room A180 of the Administration Building on the Harrisburg Campus.

Justice Saylor did his undergraduate work at the University of Virginia and received his law degree from Columbia University in 1972. After serving as First Assistant District Attorney in his native Somerset County, he was appointed Director of the Pennsylvania Bureau of Consumer Protection in 1982, and First Deputy Attorney General of the Commonwealth in 1984. Following this government service, Justice Saylor was a litigation partner for several years in the Harrisburg office of Eckert Seamans Cherin and Mellott.

He was elected to the Pennsylvania Superior Court in 1993, and in 1997 to his current position on the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. He was retained in 2007 to serve a second ten-year term.

During his tenure with the courts, Justice Saylor also pursued and obtained a Master of Laws degree in judicial studies from the University of Virginia. He has published several law journal pieces. State Constitutional law is a subject of particular interest; he recently published an article on interpretation of state constitutions.

He is a member of the Board of Overseers of Widener Law School and previously served on the Board of Directors of the Harrisburg Area Humane Society.
