
Please remember to use the Widener Law blue recycling containers to recycle here on campus. It is our responsibility to preserve and protect our natural resources for future generations.

RECYCLING FACTS



The Pizza Box Mystery

Mmm, pizza.



Many people assume that pizza boxes are recyclable. Most boxes have recycling symbols on them and are traditionally made from corrugated cardboard. **How ever**, what makes parts of them non-recyclable is the hot, tasty treat that comes in side them, specifically, the grease and cheese from pizza that gets on the card board.

So, there you have it, pizza boxes that are stained with food, or any paper products that are stained with grease or food, are not recyclable — unless you remove the tainted portions. But why is this? And what does this mean for the general, pizza-loving public?

Food is one of the worst contaminants in the paper recycling process. When paper products, like cardboard, are recycled, they are mixed with water. Since we all know water and oil don't mix, the issue is clear. Grease on pizza boxes causes the paper fibers to not separate from oils during the recycling process.

One way to solve this problem is to cut or tear out the soiled portion of your pizza box, throw away the part containing the grease, and recycle the rest. (We have all seen that telltale, greasy stain.)



If the entire box is grease-free, the whole box can be recycled with a guilt-free conscience.

<u>Reuse</u>

- · Submit a paper previously written


